

Update on James Monroe Portrait Research

As previously reported, the Museum has continued to research the provenance of a James Monroe portrait acquired in early 2015. Results of this effort indicate that the painting is likely the work of nineteenth-century portrait artist Bass Otis, who made likenesses of Monroe, James and Dolley Madison, Thomas Jefferson, and others in June or July, 1816 for a planned catalogue by



Philadelphia publisher Joseph Delaplaine that was never published. The collection was subsequently purchased by Rubens Peale for display in his New York museum, which was acquired by P.T. Barnum in 1837 for his American Museum. At least some of the Otis paintings ended up in other hands before the American Museum was destroyed by fire in 1865.

Director Scott Harris and Curator Jarod Kearney went to Monticello on March 10 to examine a portrait of Thomas Jefferson that is positively identified as the work of Otis. With assistance from Monticello assistant curator Emilie Johnson, Harris and Kearney compared proportions and features of the two portraits, which were reunited for perhaps the first time since the early 19th century. Conclusions from this investigation support the consensus of professional opinion that the Museum's portrait was painted by Bass Otis in 1816.





What's in Store?



The James Monroe Museum and Memorial Library, located in historic downtown Fredericksburg, Virginia, is the largest repository in the country for artifacts and documents related to the fifth president of the United States. The museum was first opened in 1927 by Monroe descendants as a place to house their own personal collections, which had been handed down through generations of the family. Eventually, the museum and its extensive collections were turned over to the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the museum is now administered by the University of Mary Washington.

The museum belongs to the American Association of Museums, the American Association for State and Local History, and the Virginia Association of Museums. It is also on the National Register of Historic Places and is a National Historic Landmark.
