Deck the Halls!



Virginia Presidential Trivia

Can you recognize and name the 45 presidents of the United States? James Monroe, our fifth president, served two consecutive terms from 1817 until 1825. He was one of eight presidents born in Virginia. Can you name the other seven who hailed from the Commonwealth? Would you like a fun and interesting way to learn about the presidents and teach the kids? The James Monroe Museum Store has several ways to help!

Curator's Corner



This month's featured artifact is a large ironstone punch bowl made by T. Furnival & Sons, a ceramics factory established in Staffordshire, England in 1851. Decorated with transfer print and gilding, the punch bowl was previously thought to have belonged to James Monroe. The 1850s manufacture date makes this an impossibility. However, it did belong to Monroe's descendants. The earliest record we have of the piece indicates it was passed down to James Monroe Museum and Memorial Library founding director and Monroe descendant Laurence Gouverneur Hoes through his aunt, Maud Campbell Gouverneur. Miss Gouverneur refers to it in her will as the "Monroe punch bowl," indicating it had been in the family for some time. This, along with the date of manufacture, suggests it belonged to James Monroe's grandson, Samuel Lawrence Gouverneur, Jr., who in turn gave it to his daughter Maud Campbell Gouverneur.

Produced as a less expensive alternative to porcelain, ironstone was first created in England by Charles James Mason in 1813. Named ironstone because of its strength, the ware was capable of supporting heavier weighted items, and was often employed in the mass production of larger vessels such as this punch bowl. Ironstone was not considered informal ware per se, but was not as esteemed as the higher-end ceramics such as Old Paris porcelain. Any ironstone pieces Monroe owned would have been reserved for less formal occasions such as casual dining or colloquial gatherings.
