Happy Anniversary, James and Elizabeth Monroe!

Two hundred and twenty nine years ago this month (16). February 1786), James and Elizabeth Monroe were married in New York City. He was a 28-year-old delegate to Congress and she was the beautiful 17-year-old daughter of a prosperous merchant. "The night after you left us our friend Monro was married & next morning decamp'd for Long Island with the little smiling Venus in his Arms, where they have taken house, to avoid

fulsome Complements during their first Transports," wrote Stephen Mitchell, another member of Congress, to William Johnson, on 21 February.

It was the start of happy and love-filled marriage for the Monroes. "It is a remark, which it would be unpardonable to withold, that it was improbable for any female to have fulfilled all the duties of the partner of such cares, and of a wife and parent, with more attention, delicacy and propriety than she has done," wrote Monroe in his *Autobiography*.



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The James Monroe Museum and Memorial Library, located in historic downtown Fredericksburg, Virginia, is the largest repository in the country for artifacts and documents related to the fifth president of the United States. The museum was first opened in 1927 by Monroe descendants as a place to house their own personal collections, which had been handed down through generations of the family. Eventually, the museum and its extensive collections were turned over to the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the museum is now administered by the University of Mary Washington.

The museum belongs to the American Association of Museums, the American Association for State and Local History, and the Virginia Association of Museums. It is also on the National Register of Historic Places and is a National Historic Landmark.
